

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

Shine a Light

The Irish theatre avoids British writing. It is tempting to ask why. Lazy answers present themselves. We are now so confident a culture we stand entirely alone. If we need to look abroad, it is to the fresh fields of Europe. This, of course, is bollocks. The reason we back away from the best of our neighbour's plays - and playwriting there over the past thirty years has cracked a hard, impressive punch - is that they are difficult, unsettling, questioning texts. The new Ireland, increasingly fixated on a sentimental reading of its past and present, more and more shies away from serious confrontation in the theatre. Well, that's been our loss, and not least with regard to David Hare.

For the past thirty years, he has produced a body of work that is complex, subtle, and extensive. His play, The Secret Rapture, possesses an overwhelming compassion, creating an extraordinary, forgiving voice for the cruelties of Thatcherism. Only Hare could look at those dark days in his country's history and still see light of purest illumination that burns at the very core of his art.

It is an art that depends deeply on the fluency of his characters. Kyra and Tom in Skylight articulate the chronicle of their love with a sore need to say what it was. In saying it, they might save love or they might lose it. But they try. At least they try. And they do so, not as spoilt children, but as adults who have sinned and suffered. They know that much at least.

I don't want to give the play away, but wait for the ending. It could not be predicted, and it is magnificent. It also clarifies David Hare's great theme. Hope, hope earned, hope eternal. That is reason enough to cherish him.

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
David Hare

David Hare is one of Britain's most internationally performed playwrights. His long association with the Royal National Theatre includes the now legendary production of his trilogy about the church, the law and the Labour Party – Racing Demon, Murmuring Judges and The Absence of War.

Nine of his plays have been presented on Broadway, including Plenty, The Secret Rapture, Skylight, The Blue Room, Amy's View and Via Dolorosa, in which he also performed. He recently wrote the film The Hours, which starred Meryl Streep, Julianne Moore and Nicole Kidman. His most recent plays are The Breath of Life, with Maggie Smith and Judi Dench, and The Permanent Way, which is currently playing at the National Theatre in London.

Michael Caven is Artistic Director of awardwinning The Theatreworks Company, for whom he recently directed Macbeth (in association with Second Age), and previously Tales From Ovid (nominated

Special Judges Award 2002 Irish Theatre Awards); Richard III (nominated Best Director 2001 Irish Theatre Awards); the Irish Premiere of Mutabilitie by Frank McGuinness: Anna Karenina by Helen Edmundson (nominated Best Director 1998 Irish Theatre Awards); Troilus and Cressida: Venus and Adonis and The Fetishist by Michel Tournier.

Credits at the Gate Theatre, Dublin, include the shape of things by Neil LaBute (nominated Best Director 2002 Irish Theatre Awards) and Thérèse Raquin by Emile Zola. For NYU, for whom Michael is Dublin Program Director, credits include Best Possible World by Tee O'Neill; The Mai by Marina Carr: Women of Troy by Kenneth McLeish; Beauty Queen of Leenane by Martin McDonagh and Dolly West's Kitchen by Frank McGuinness. Credits for the Samuel Beckett Centre include Serious Money by Caryl Churchill; The Artaud Project (devised in collaboration with Michael Bogdanov); New Morning by Declan Hughes; Camino Real by Tennessee Williams and Nana by Olwen Wymark.

Designer

Joe Vaněk



Joe Vaněk has been designing extensively for the Irish stage since 1984 and from 1994 -1997 was Director of Design at the Abbey under Patrick

He is principally known for his designs for the more recent

plays of Brian Friel, Dancing at Lughnasa, Wonderful Tennessee and Molly Sweeney, all three of which transferred to Broadway where for Lughnasa he was nominated for two Tony Awards. More recently he has designed the premiere of Performances, Brian Friel's play about Leos Janacek, at the Gate, and the recent revival of Aristocrats at the Abbey.

He has designed new works by other leading Irish playwrights, including Sebastian Barry, Hugh Leonard, Frank McGuinness and Thomas Kilroy as well as a stage adaptation of John Banville's The Book of Evidence, and work by the American playwright and director Neil LaBute.

Alongside opera and ballet designs in Ireland, the UK, Holland, Denmark and the USA, recent international work has included, in the US, the west coast premiere of Marina Carr's By the Bog of Cats with Holly Hunter, Flemming Flindt's two ballets Legs of Fire and The Triumph of Death, and, in Denmark, Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?

Next month he returns to the Abbey to stage Tom Murphy's new adaptation of Chekhov's The Cherry Orchard.


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Lighting Designer

Rupert Murray is a freelance lighting designer and producer with over one hundred and fifty lighting design credits to his name.

Recent designs include the shape of things, Pride and Prejudice, A

Christmas Carol, Waiting for Godot, The **Eccentricities of a Nightingale, Crestfall** and Jane Eyre for the Gate Theatre; Ariel, Lovers at Versailles, Communion, All My Sons, The Plough and the Stars and Aristocrats for the Abbey and Peacock Theatres; The Good Father for Druid

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Theatre Company and The Drunkard for b*spoke theatre company. He is the lighting designer for the international hit Riverdance - The Show.

Rupert was Festival Director of the St. Patrick's Festival from 1995 to 1999 and was a key member of the team which transformed Ireland's national celebrations. For the last five years he has been responsible for producing and directing the opening festivities at the Wexford Festival Opera and he was the Creative Director of the Opening Ceremony for the Special Olympics World Summer Games held in Croke Park in June 2003.

Cathy Belton studied English and Drama (Samuel Beckett Centre) at Trinity College, Dublin. Her appearances at the Abbey and Peacock theatres include A Whistle in the Dark, The Playboy of the Western World.

Tartuffe, Medea, The Broken Jug, Living Quarters, A Crucial Week in the Life of A Grocer's Assistant and Silverlands. Most recently she appeared first as Rosie Redmond and then as Nora Clitheroe in the Abbev's recent productions of The Plough and the Stars. Other theatre work includes Shiver (Rough Magic), The Tempest, Romeo and Juliet, Hamlet (Island Theatre Company), Eclipsed (Town Hall Theatre, Galway), Stolen Child (Calypso Theatre Company), Silas Marner, Women in Arms (Storytellers Theatre Company), True Lines (Bickerstaffe Theatre Company), Buddleia and Kitchensink (Passion Machine Theatre Company) and Hamlet (Loose Canon Theatre Company). Television credits include A House in Jerusalem (RTE), Glenroe (RTE), Tri Scéal for TG4, Paths to Freedom and Fergus' Wedding (Grand Pictures/RTE). Most recently Cathy completed filming the role of Kay Corcoran in Proof, a TV mini-series for Subotica/RTE. 
He also performed in The Shadow of A Gunman as Seamus Sheils, Great
